Sunday, June 2

Scripture: I Samuel 3:1-10 (11-20), Psalm 139:1-6 and 13-18, 2 Corinthians 4:5-12, Mark 2:23-3:6

Our lesson from the Old Testament is from I Samuel and is the call of the child Samuel and the beginning of his prophetic activity. "For it was you who formed my inward parts; you knit me together in my mother's womb," highlight the psalmist's words which acknowledge how much God knows about us and how wonderful that is. The epistle lesson from 2 Corinthians is one sometimes read at funerals. In it, Paul writes, "But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us." in the gospel reading from Mark we are offered two stories about Jesus doing "wrong" things on the Sabbath. In the stories Jesus and his hungry disciples break the law by picking grain as they are walking through a field and later heal a man with a withered hand

Sunday, June 9

Scripture: I Samuel 8:4-11 (12-15), 16-20, Psalm 138, 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1, Mark 3:20-35

For many years, judges governed the Israelites. In our reading today, the elders of Israel came to Samuel and demanded that he appoint a King to rule over the nation. Our gospel lesson this Sunday finds Jesus being compared to Satan and then in the following paragraph, Jesus, in the presence of his biological mother and siblings, claims all believers as his family. In Second Corinthians, Paul speaks of the power and effect the Spirit has on the faithful saying, "So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day." The psalm is a song of thanksgiving and praise.

Sunday, June 16

Scripture: I Samuel 15:34-16:13, Psalm 20, 2 Corinthians 5:6-10, (11-13), 14-17, Mark 4:26-34

The gospel lesson this week has us reading the parables of the Growing Seed and the Mustard Seed. In Second Corinthians, Paul teaches us what it means to live by faith. The Old Testament continues through the book of I Samuel telling us the story of Saul and David. This week we read about Saul's death and how Samuel reviews seven of Jesse's son and finally anoints Jesse's eighth and youngest son, David, as King of Israel. The psalm, a prayer for victory, makes the case that in the day of trouble, God will answer.

Sunday, June 23

Scripture: I Samuel 17: (1a, 4-11, 19-23) 32-49, Psalm 9:9-20, 2 Corinthians 6:1-13, Mark 4:35-41

The lesson from the Hebrew Scriptures on this Sunday is the lengthy story of David and Goliath. Psalm 9 is a song about God's power and justice. Remember that God's justice is not about people getting what they deserve or what is right, but what they need. The gospel lesson found in Mark is about Jesus calming a storm by simply saying, "Be quiet and be still." In the epistle lesson, despite the harsh challenges of being a faithful Christian, Paul testifies the Spirit empowers the faithful to live a righteous life.

Sunday, June 30


Scripture: 2 Samuel 1:1 and 17-27, Psalm 130, 2 Corinthians 8:7-15, Mark 5:21-43

At the beginning of 2 Samuel, the scriptures offer us a lamentation, written by David, about the death of Saul. Psalm 130, one of the more familiar psalms, begins, "Out of the depth I cry to you, O Lord. Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications!" The psalm continues as a song about waiting for divine redemption. As we move to the New Testament, Paul, in the Second Letter to the Corinthians, encourages the members of the church in Corinth to be generous, in much the same way as Jesus, who gave up his riches and life for the sake of others. Finally, in the gospel of Mark, we are offered the account of Jesus healing of the woman who had hemorrhages for twelve years, placed in the middle of the story of Jesus healing Jairus' daughter.


Since Independence Day is celebrated in the middle of the week following this Sunday, some of our music will celebrate the July 4 holiday this week.

Pastor's Message

Symbols and the Old Testament Timeline







As I announced to the Council, Spiritual Council, and those who received the weekly happenings article, I have chosen "Church Symbols" as the theme for summer worship. I was inspired to choose this theme several months ago and have been preparing for this unexpectedly ambitious choice since then. I will describe the many distinct kinds of crosses like the two above and a lot of the countless church symbols like the pelican shown on page 2 of this newsletter..

Symbols:

It did not take me long to realize this could be an ambitious theme that could last far longer than the twelve or fourteen weeks of summer. The first book on symbols which I purchased described 18 different crosses. The second book which arrived at my desk illustrated and explained well over 80 different crosses. It will be a challenge to share them all with you in the next three months, but I will try.

You might also be surprised to learn that there are hundreds of church symbols which represent each of the four gospels, the twelve disciples, numerous biblical figures, and countless saints (most of which are completely unfamiliar to me). I hope to share many of the biblical prophets, patriarchs, and other figures with you, but I doubt I will share many (or any) of the symbols of the saints.

I also aim to share the more familiar symbols associated with the Trinity – Father, Son, and Spirit. Furthermore, I hope to offer you many doctrinal and worship related symbols like ones related to baptism, the Lord's Supper, and the church.

Finally, throughout the summer, you may also see explanations of descriptions of other symbols (here is the teaser) like almonds, barley, cedar, daisy, holly, lily, lily of the valley, oak, pomegranate, and so many more I do not know where to begin. If there is a symbol you wish to know more about please let me know!

Old Testament Timeline

The other change to our summer worship will be the choice of the lectionary readings I will use. In the season after Pentecost, churches are given the choice of two sets of Old Testament readings. One set of an Old Testament reading, and a Psalm are thematically related to the gospel and epistle reading. The other choice of Old Testament readings, again, and Old treatment reading and a Psalm, chronologically follow a portion of the Testament books. I will be using this option for the rest of the year.

Our current Lectionary is Year B, the middle of the three-year cycle and the "semi-continuous" Old Testament readings from Year B begin with readings from the book of I Samuel and lead us through 2 Samuel, I and 2 Kings, and into the Wisdom and Prophetic books which follow.

I hope you like what I will be doing. Should you have any questions or concerns, you know where to find me.
