# Sunday, March 2: Last Sunday of Epiphany or Transfiguration Sunday

**Scripture:** Exodus 34:29-35, Psalm 99, 2 Corinthians 3:12-4:2, Luke 9:28-36 (37-43a)

As March begins, the season of Epiphany ends with the Last Sunday of Epiphany and the expected account of Jesus transfigured on the mountaintop before three of his disciples. In the Old Testament book of Exodus, we have a similar story where Moses' face shines after being in God's presence as it reflects the glory of God. The Psalm is a summons to praise. In 2 Corinthians, Paul writes about seeing God clearly, unlike the Hebrews, and responding by living an honest and faithful life.

## Wednesday, March 5: Ash Wednesday

**Scripture:** Joel 2:1-2 and 12-17, Psalm 51:1-17, 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10, Matthew 6:1-6 and 16-21

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday with its theme of repentance and mortality. The psalm and its words, "Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin," highlight this theme. It is a confession of sin and prayer for forgiveness. The prophet Isaiah compares true and false worship while Paul shares a call to be reconciled to God. Finally, in the gospel of Matthew, Jesus teaches about how to give alms, pray, fast, and live a faithful life.

# Sunday, March 9: First Sunday in Lent

**Scripture:** Deuteronomy 26:1-11, Psalm 91:1-2 and 9-16, Romans 10:8b-13, Luke 4:1-13

The first Sunday of Lent brings us the Lukan account of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness. Paul tells the Romans about the power of confessing Christ and the cross with their lips and with their heart. The psalmist addresses the peace and security of the godly and in Deuteronomy we are given instructions regarding offerings and thanksgiving.

# Sunday, March 16: Second Sunday in Lent

**Scripture:** Genesis 15:1-12 and 17-18, Psalm 27, Philippians 3:17-4:1, Luke 13:31-35

This week the Old Testament lessons are uplifting and positive while the New Testament lessons are more serious and challenging. In Genesis God makes a covenant with Abram and promises him an heir and the psalm is David's song of confidence. In Paul's letter to the Philippians, there is a warning against downplaying God's laws and saving action of Jesus and the cross. In Luke, Jesus sends a message to Herod, who wants to kill him, and sadly weeps over Jerusalem.

# Sunday, March 23: Third Sunday in Lent

Scripture: Isaiah 55:1-9, Psalm 63:1-8, I Corinthians 10:1-13, Luke 13:1-9
As we venture into the heart of the Lenten season the theme of repentance rises up again. Isaiah prophetically speaks God's words saying the repentant will be blessed and will be commanded to seek the Lord and in Luke, Jesus, too, calls his followers to repent for sinful ways. Paul, in his letter to the Corinthians, using immoral Israelites as an example, exhorts us not to engage in immorality. And according to the psalmist thirsty souls who seek God will be quenched.

# Sunday, March 30: Fourth Sunday in Lent

**Scripture:** Joshua 5:9-12, Psalm 32, 2 Corinthians 5:16-21, Luke 15:1-3 and 11b-32

Our lectionary cycle this week invites us to read the parable of the Lost or Prodigal Son in the New Testament gospel lesson from Luke. And in the Old Testament book of Joshua we are offered a story of how the Passover should be kept. The Psalm is a penitent's psalm which comments on the benefits of confession. Finally in 2 Corinthians, Paul speaks about the ministry of reconciliation saying, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!"

# **Pastor's Message**

Last week, from Tuesday, February 18 through Thursday, February 20 I attended a clergy retreat sponsored by the Central Atlantic Conference of the United Church of Christ. This was the first time I have attended an event like this in years and I truly enjoyed it. It was a time to renew friendships with clergy I have not seen in a while, meet new clergy, and participate in educational workshops, and be a part of inspirational worship services.



The guest speaker was Rev. Dr. Mary Luti, and she spoke about the Sacrament of Communion. Rev. Luti is a retired minister and professor. For twenty-two years before her retirement, Luti taught the history of Christianity, Christian worship, and preaching at the former Andover Newton Theological School (now Andover Newton Seminary at Yale). Ordained in the United Church of Christ, she also served First Church in Cambridge, Congregational, in Cambridge, Massachusetts, as its sixteenth minister since 1633 and the first woman to occupy that historic pulpit. Her most recent publication is *Do This:* Communion for Just and Courageous Living, from Pilgrim Press

(Stillspeaking Writers Group).

Rev Luti and many of the other leaders of the retreat were energetic, faithful, and inspirational, and I walked away from the retreat definitely feeling renewed. It was so nice I thought I would like to share some of the highlights from the retreat with you.

Here are a few of the simple things I learned:

- The Congregationalists of New England, one of the predecessor denominations in the United Church of Christ, founded the Pilgrim Press which is the oldest surviving publishing operation in North America, The Pilgrim Press was founded in 1617 as an act of religious resistance and continues today as a bold witness for Christian faith that challenges the status quo.
- Little communion cups were not used until the early 1890's and were created due to increased knowledge and fear of spreading germs. In the previous 1900 years, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was always celebrated with a common cup.
- Like many Roman Catholic Saints, Martin Luther, the Protestant Reformer has a Feast Day. The feast day associated with reformer Martin Luther (February 18) is widely celebrated not just in Lutheran congregations, but in a wide variety of denominations and traditions who have been affected by his transformative theological teachings, most particularly that salvation cannot be earned by good deeds,

Retreats and events where clergy gather are often places where we spend beaucoup bucks on books. I only bought two books. (well less than \$100)!


Mary Luti's book, "Do This"

Do This: Communion for Just and Courageous Living is a starting point for (re)engaging the life-shaping themes of Communion:

belonging and memory,

- bodies and violence,
- food and creation care,
- labor and resilience,
- reconciliation and healing.

With new reflections and prayers, original hymns, and liturgies, *Do This* puts holy mystery into joyful and just practice.





"The New Bluegrass Hymn" by Rev. Amy Sens Written with congregations in mind, The New Bluegrass Hymnal combines good music and progressive theology for a starter kit of music that churches can use to lead their own bluegrass worship services.

The primary focus of our days together was the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, otherwise known as Communion, or the Eucharist. We discussed matters such as:

- The boundaries (or lack of boundaries) we set for communion.
- The frequency of its celebration
- Its history especially the liturgical structure
- Practical matters such as how the table is set, how it tastes
- A major component of a communion liturgy is remembering or anamnesis.
   Rev Luti offered strong opinions about who and what we are called to remember, especially:
  - Jesus, we are called to remember the whole Jesus, not just the fun comforting parts
  - Each other/communion of saints
  - Mighty deeds of God
  - The poor and our call to serve
- Confession needs to be included in communion service
- Jesus, at the table, fed the denier and the betrayer, but Jesus also calls them
  out. Jesus told them the truth but still fed them. It is not easy to accept, but
  Jesus confronted his disciples at the table. At times he was oppositional
- In communion we are called take a stand, We must remember who/whose we are and ALL that it means.

Finally, we Rev. Luti shared with us her wish list for worship and Communion, some of which I think is worth consideration. Again, these are her preferences

- She dislikes beginning the worship with, "Good Morning." Rev. Luti would prefer, "The Lord be with you," or something more faith based.
- Rev. Luti would like to reconnect word and sacrament. This means using liturgy that includes the scripture lessons used on that day in the communion liturgy
- A good communion service would include a confession in or near the sacrament's liturgy
- She would restore the offertory, meaning we should bring the communion ware and elements and symbols of all the week's work of the congregation to the altar.
  - Dedicate all or a portion of communion Sunday offering to the poor.
     This would be a true connection and communion with "everyone."
- In the same way the Lord's Prayer looks to the future in its words, "Thy
  Kingdom come," the sacrament of communion should also be future oriented
  as we seek to lets God's commonwealth (remember Mary is from
  Massachusetts) come and be built here!

I did not realize how much we discussed, because I could have written a few more pages for this summary, but I won't. I will simply thank you for allowing me to attend this retreat and be fed in so many ways.
