Pastor's Message

As we enter the summer months, as I often do, I venture away from the designated lectionary readings and select a theme for the summer. After careful consideration, and in consultation with our members, I have selected the theme of:

Minor Prophets

The Minor Prophets are the twelve, hard to find, little books with the “funny” names at the end of the Old Testament. Ancient Hebrew scribes compiled the twelve shorter prophetic works into a single scroll, known as The Twelve (or Trei Asar in Aramaic). This aggregation was done primarily for practical and theological reasons.

In antiquity, as mentioned above, texts were written on physical scrolls. Individual scrolls were costly and had physical limits on how much text they could contain. Because the twelve writings (such as Hosea, Amos, and Jonah) were too short to justify a whole scroll each, scribes grouped them together so they could all fit onto a single, standard-sized scroll.

The Twelve span a large chunk of Israel's history, but they share thematic cohesion as a unified body of literature. Grouping them together allowed ancient readers to view them as an ongoing, interconnected prophetic discourse rather than isolated fragments.

As you look at the outline of the Books in the summer schedule offered below, if you know your Bible well, you will see I am scheduling them in a way that does not match their order in our Bibles. I am presenting them in the order in which historians believe they were written. With that said, please allow me to offer a brief history lesson of the Jewish world of the prophet's time.

Northern and Southern Kingdom

After King Solomon's death (likely 931 BCE), the ancient nation of Israel split into two separate states: the Northern Kingdom (Israel), which was made up of 10 tribes, and the Southern Kingdom (Judah), comprising the tribes of Judah and Benjamin. Both existed for over two centuries before falling to outside empires.

The Northern Kingdom was larger in size and wealthier, but experienced severe political instability and frequent dynastic changes. Because they no longer had access to the Temple in Jerusalem, their kings established alternative religious sites, which often

strayed into idol worship and attracted heavy criticism from biblical prophets. In 722 BCE, the Northern Kingdom was conquered and destroyed by the Neo-Assyrian Empire. The Assyrians exiled the populace, leading to the "Ten Lost Tribes" of Israel.

The Southern Kingdom, again, was composed primarily of the tribes of Judah and Benjamin. Its capital was Jerusalem, and was smaller and more isolated geographically, but significantly more politically stable, than its Northern counterpart. It was ruled continuously by the Davidic dynasty for its entire existence. Its religion remained deeply tied to the Temple in Jerusalem and the strict adherence to Mosaic Law and priestly traditions. The south survived the Assyrian invasions but was later conquered by the Babylonian Empire under King Nebuchadnezzar. Jerusalem and its Temple were destroyed in 586 BCE, leading to the Babylonian Exile.

Like the Exodus from Egypt which happened many centuries earlier, the Exile and Captivity of the Hebrews had significant political, cultural, religious consequences.

The Two Major Exiles

While "the exile" generally refers to the Babylonian captivity, the Old Testament actually features two distinct exiles of the Hebrew people:

- The Assyrian Exile (722 BC): The Assyrian Empire conquered the Northern Kingdom of Israel (the ten tribes) and scattered its people throughout the Assyrian empire. They largely assimilated into other cultures and became known as the "Lost Tribes of Israel."
- The Babylonian Exile (586 BC): The Babylonians conquered the Southern Kingdom of Judah (containing the tribes of Judah and Benjamin) after a series of rebellions. In multiple waves, the intellectual, religious, and economic elite were deported to Babylon.

Why Did It Happen?

According to the biblical narrative, the exile was viewed as God's judgment and discipline for the people's repeated covenant unfaithfulness, specifically their centuries-long struggles with idolatry, social injustice, and rebellion against God's laws. The prophets—such as Jeremiah and Ezekiel—warned of this destruction for decades prior. The Minor prophets, were all centered around the time of the Exile. It is for this reason that I have chosen to present them chronologically in their historical context, which is summarized below.

Pre-Exilic Period

These prophets ministered before the fall of Israel (to Assyria) and Judah (to Babylon).

- Joel (c. 835–800 BC): Addressed the Southern Kingdom (Judah) and used a severe locust plague as a warning of coming judgment.
- Jonah (c. 785–760 BC): Sent by God to preach repentance to Nineveh, the capital of the Assyrian Empire.
- Amos (c. 760–750 BC): A shepherd from Judah who prophesied against the social injustice and idolatry of the Northern Kingdom (Israel).
- Hosea (c. 750–710 BC): Preached to the Northern Kingdom, using his own marriage to an unfaithful wife as a metaphor for God's unfailing love for wayward Israel.

- Micah (c. 735–700 BC): Ministered in Judah, warning of judgment for social evils while prophesying that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem.
- Nahum (c. 660–612 BC): Prophesied the ultimate destruction of Nineveh and the collapse of the Assyrian Empire.
- Zephaniah (c. 640–621 BC): Preached in Judah during King Josiah's reforms, warning of the "Day of the Lord" and calling the nation to repentance.
- Habakkuk (c. 609–605 BC): Questioned God's justice in using the Babylonians to punish Judah but ultimately chose to rejoice in God's sovereignty. [[1](#), [2](#), [3](#), [4](#), [5](#)]

Exilic Period

These prophets ministered during or immediately after the conquest of Judah by the Babylonians.

- Obadiah (c. 586 BC): The shortest book in the Old Testament; a brief oracle of judgment against Edom for their treachery against Judah. [[1](#)]

Post-Exilic Period

These prophets ministered after the Babylonian exile, when Jews were returning to Jerusalem to rebuild the temple and the city.

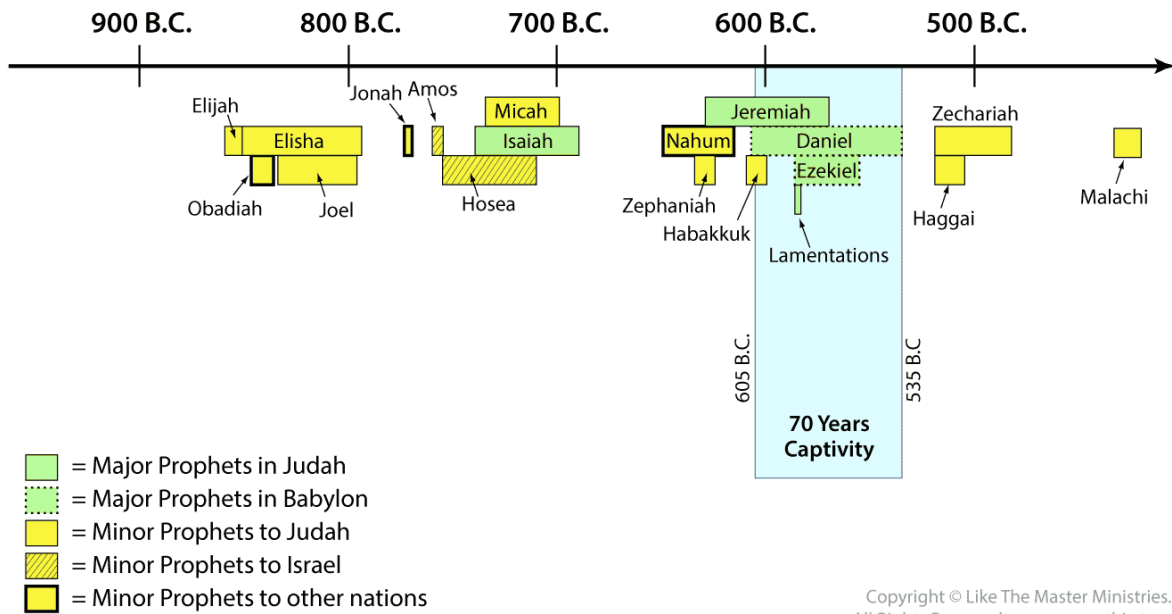
- Haggai (c. 520 BC): Urged the returned exiles to prioritize and finish rebuilding the Temple in Jerusalem.
- Zechariah (c. 520–518 BC): A contemporary of Haggai, his visions encouraged the people to rebuild the temple and contain deep messianic prophecies.
- Malachi (c. 433–424 BC): The final prophetic voice of the Old Testament, calling a spiritually apathetic post-exilic community back to faithful living. [[1](#), [2](#), [3](#), [4](#), [5](#)]

Note: The exact dates for the ministries of Joel and Obadiah remain heavily debated by biblical scholars, though their general placement aligns with the timeline above.

Each week this summer, beginning on June 14, I will present each of the Minor prophets, asking these questions.

 - Review outline of book
 - What are the best known verses of the book
 - Theme and Message
 - Unique traits
- What are the connection to New Testament/Christian Scriptures?

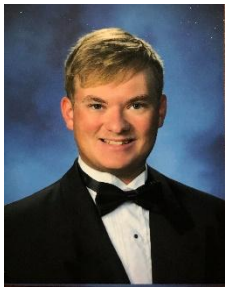
