Sunday, October 2 Proper 22

Scripture: Habakkuk 1:1-4 and 2:1-4, Psalm 37:1-9, 2 Timothy 1:1-14, Luke 17:5-10

The first Sunday in October will bring us World Communion Sunday and lessons about patience, trust, and humility. The prophet Habakkuk complains to God, and after waiting awhile, God offers him, and us, a word of comfort. The psalm is an exhortation to patience and trust and Paul, in his second letter to Timothy, offers words of thanksgiving and encouragement to his young companion. In the gospel of Luke, we find two sayings of Jesus. The first of the two is his response to the disciple's request for greater faith, and the second is Jesus' comparison of the role of the disciples to the work and position of a slave or servant.

Sunday, October 9 Proper 23

Scripture: 2 Kings 5:1-3 and 7-15c, Psalm 111, 2 Timothy 2:8-15, Luke 17:11-19 Healing is the theme which carries through the scriptural lessons on this Sunday. The Old Testament lesson from 2 Kings is the story of Elisha healing the powerful enemy general Naaman of leprosy. In the gospel of Luke, Jesus heals ten lepers, but only the Samaritan among them comes back and gives thanks. The psalmist offers us a song of praise for God's wonderful works and the apostle Paul shares his difficult experiences as he writes about his hardships and exhorts Timothy to faithful endurance.

Sunday, October 16 Proper 24

Scripture: Genesis 32:22-31, Psalm 121, 2 Timothy 3:14-4:5, Luke 18:1-8
Pastor Dale, after officiating the wedding of Diana's and his niece, will be taking this Sunday off, and inviting Pastor Cesar Gonzalez to fill the pulpit. As many of you know, Pastor Gonzalez usually does preach from the lectionary but if you would like to know what the scheduled lessons are, please keep reading!

The most familiar words this week may be from the Psalm where we hear, "I lift up my eyes to the hills— from where will my help come? My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth. He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber. He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep." In Genesis, Jacob wrestles with God at Peniel and receives a blessing. An assurance of God's protection is found in the Psalm and in Luke we are offered the Parable of the Widow and the Unjust Judge who only grants the woman justice because she is relentless in the pursuit of her cause. Paul, in the epistle lesson, encourages Timothy, to value, as he has done since his childhood, the sacred scriptures and to have faith in Jesus Christ.

Sunday, October 23 Proper 25

Scripture: Sirach 35:12-17 or Jeremiah 14:7-10, Psalm 84:1-7, 2 Timothy 4:6-8 and 16-18, Luke 18:9-14

This week, the thematic scriptural choices offered by the Revised Common Lectionary, include a choice between a lesson from Sirach (a book found in the Apocrypha) and the prophet Jeremiah. In Sirach, the book written in the time between the Old and New Testaments, we have a lesson that talks about divine justice that builds on the ethic of helping the poor and the prophet Jeremiah writes about the people of Israel who humbly confess their iniquities to God, during a life-threatening drought. Humility continues as a theme in Luke as we read the Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector where one prays very loudly, publicly, and insincerely while the other prays humbly, sincerely, and privately. The Psalm is about the joy of worship in the Temple and in 2 Timothy Paul looks toward his death and a heavenly reward.

Sunday, October 30: Reformation/Reconciliation Sunday, Proper 26
Scripture: Isaiah 1:10-18, Psalm 32:1-17, 2 Thessalonians 1:1-4 and 11-12, Luke 19:1-10

On a Sunday when we may remember the contributions of the Reformers of the 1500's, one might say the lectionary readings are about how we are called to respond to the words of scripture with openness and sincerity.

In the Old Testament book of Isaiah, the prophet writes about how God rejects ritual worship unless the worship practices are accompanied by a genuine change to moral behavior. In the gospel of Luke, we are offered the account of Zacchaeus, the tax collector who was curious about Jesus, climbing the tree and Jesus calling him down and dining with him. The first verse of the psalm, which is about the joy of forgiveness, is, "Happy are those whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered." And in Paul's second letter to the church in Thessalonica, we hear the greeting and intercessory prayer at the beginning of the letter.

Ramp Build

On Saturday, November 12 our church is going to build a ramp for a person in need in Dorchester County. We will, once again, be working with Chesapeake Housing Mission out of Salisbury, who are experts in guiding volunteers in the installation of sold and sturdy ramps which are so desperately needed. The details are being finalized, but many volunteers are needed, so mark the date on your calendar, tell your friends about it, and join us however you can as we help a family in need in our community. Immanuel has helped build two ramps. The last ramp was built on June 14, 2019, and here are a few reminders of that effort.

He is asked 183 questions, of which he only answers 3.


Asking questions was central to Jesus' life and teachings.

In fact, for every question he answers directly he asks—literally—a hundred.




Walter Brueggemann is an American Protestant Old Testament scholar and theologian who is widely considered one of the most influential Old Testament scholars of the last several decades. The son of a minister of the German Evangelical Synod of North America. He was ordained in the United Church of Christ. He was professor of Old Testament at Eden Theological Seminary and later at Columbia Theological Seminary, from which he retired in the early 2000s. Rev. Dr. Brueggemann's books were required reading in seminary and I heard him speak at Central Atlantic Conference meetings and other events.



Diana Butler Bass was born in Baltimore, Maryland, and grew up in Scottsdale, Arizona. She was raised a United Methodist, and became an evangelical. Today she is an American historian of Christianity and an advocate for progressive Christianity. She is the author of eleven books, many of which have won research or writing awards. Bass earned a PhD in religious studies from Duke University in 1991 with an emphasis on American ecclesiastical history, she wrote a weekly column on religion and culture for the New York Times Syndicate that appeared in more than seventy newspapers nationwide, and has since become a popular commentator on American religion for other media outlets. As of this date, Bass is a member of the Episcopal Church.



Oscar Romero became the archbishop of El Salvador in 1977. Seen as a social conservative at the time of his appointment as archbishop in 1977, As archbishop, Romero spoke out against social injustice and violence amid the escalating conflict between the military government and left-wing insurgents that led to the Salvadoran Civil War. In 1980, Romero was shot by an assassin while celebrating Mass.




PRE-PAID FUEL 2022-2023
