Worship Schedule

Sunday mornings – the heart of our life together

10:00 Worship for All Ages – Sanctuary & via Zoom

As we near the end of the Easter season, there are several worship services that are defined by their “distance” away from Easter. Forty days after Easter, which is a Thursday, we celebrate Ascension Day. Some “high” churches have a worship service on this day to honor Jesus’ Ascension into heaven, while other churches, like ours, may celebrate the Ascension on the following Sunday.

Fifty days after Easter, many churches celebrate Pentecost, the day when the Holy Spirit descends on the apostles, fills them with the power to serve God, and unites them in mission and purpose to create the Church of Jesus Christ.

And finally, one week after Pentecost, we celebrate Trinity Sunday.

Thursday, May 29: Ascension Day

Scripture: Acts 1:1-11, Psalm 47 or 93, Ephesians 1:15-23,
Luke 24:44-53

In his final appearance to the disciples in the gospel of Luke, and with instructional and reaffirming words, Jesus shares his last words with them, blesses them, and is lifted up into the heavens. In Acts of the Apostles, the same writer tells the same story that ended the gospel of Luke again at the beginning of the book which describes the days of the early church.

Acknowledging the Ascension of Christ and more, Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians, opens the letter with a prayer of thanksgiving and blessing for the church. Psalm 47 is a song about God the king of the nations and Psalm 93 is a psalm of praise celebrating the majesty of God’s rule.

We will likely not use these scriptures as the focus of Sunday worship on June 1, but use the 7th Sunday of Easter Scripture lessons.

Sunday, June 1: Seventh Sunday of Easter

Scripture: Acts 16:16-34, Psalm 97, Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, and 20-21, John 17:20-26

On the seventh Sunday after Easter, we will begin with a lengthy and involved account of Paul and Silas upsetting the wealthy in something of a

battle for power. After being beaten and imprisoned for an act of faith, an earthquake frees Paul, Silas, and all of the other prisoners, and inspires their jailer to faith in Jesus. The Psalm has several, “Rejoice’s,” and is a song of the glory of God’s reign, while the sentences from Revelation are words of hope and promise from the epilogue of the book of Revelation -- the last book and words of the entire Bible. Finally, in the gospel of John, in a portion of Jesus’ Farewell address, we have an extended and more personal prayer of Jesus which includes his words and wish, “that they (his followers) may be all be one.”

Sunday, June 8: Pentecost Sunday and Graduate Sunday

Scripture: Genesis 11:1-9, Acts 2:1-21, Psalm 104:24-34 and 35b, Romans 8:14-17, John 14:8-17 (25-27)

This Sunday is the fiftieth day after Christ’s resurrection, and it is the day the apostles are filled with the Holy Spirit and called to serve and build the Church. By some accounts it is the birthday of the church, by other accounts it is the day the church was given its mission and marching orders. The first scripture we will use today is the lesson which comes from the eleventh chapter of Genesis. It is the story of the Tower of Babel and speaks of division among humanity. The passage in Acts 2 is the traditional account of Pentecost, which begins with violent winds, tongues of fire, and a host of languages spoken by the apostles and understood by the crowd. It ends with young men seeing visions, old men dreaming dreams, and more. Some say the division created in Genesis is overcome by the power of the Holy Spirit in Acts, others suggest it is the comparison of two communities – one built by human wisdom and the other assembled with the power and wisdom and will of God. Also, emphasizing the theme of unity, the letter to the Romans our lesson on this week comes at the end of a section where Paul demonstrates that Jews and Gentiles alike need a Savior and then expounds on Jesus Christ as Savior of all. In the gospel lesson, the disciple Philip prompts Jesus to discuss his relationship to the Father and Holy Spirit. The psalmist speaks about God as Creator and Provider.

Sunday, June 15: Trinity Sunday

Scripture: Proverbs 8:1-4 and 22-31, Psalm 8, Romans 5:1-5, John 16:12-15

The week following Pentecost, in higher liturgical traditions, is celebrated as Trinity Sunday. There are few biblical passages in which Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are found in one sentence or verse, and on first look our scripture lessons don’t seem to focus on the triune nature of God.

The personification of Wisdom is found in the lesson from the book of Proverbs. In the book of Psalms, divine majesty and human dignity are front and center. Jesus, in the gospel of John, talks about the work of the Spirit. In the letter to the Romans, Paul speaks about being justified by Christ, and adding, “we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us.”

Sunday, June 22 and beyond . . .

The theme of our summer worship and sermons will be “Women in the Bible.” Please see the Pastor’s Message in this newsletter for more information.

Pastor’s Message

Have you ever started a simple job and watch it mushroom into a costly, monster project. Have you ever tried to repair one electrical receptacle and wind up needing to rewire the entire house? Or have you ever started to plan a small, intimate wedding only to wind up with a guest list of 250 and a budget so large you could use it for a downpayment on a family size house? This is my dilemma.

As many of you know, I often stray from the lectionary for guidance in worship and preaching preparation during the summer months. In summers past I have selected themes like the “Family Tree of the Bible,” or “Spiritual Messages in Secular Songs,” or even “Stump the Pastor,” where I took requests from the congregation for preaching content. And so, about two months ago I thought a good subject for a summer theme this year would be, “Women of the Bible.” I thought, pick 10 or 12 Biblical women, create a schedule, and in the June newsletter tell the congregation when I would be preaching about each woman. But thinking always seems to get us in trouble!

With my goal of creating summer sermon series in hand, a couple of months ago, I started recording my ideas for my work. I started with a list of Biblical women I thought would be good subjects for sermons. The list began with:

- Eve
- Sarah
- Hannah

- Rebekah/Leah
- Miriam
- Esther
- Mary the mother of Jesus
- Mary Magdalene
- Eunice and Lois, Timothy's mother, and grandmother

And then I thought of lesser known women who had significant stories. A couple of these women included:

- Joseph's (coat of many colors) sister Dinah
- Jephthah's daughter, who likely was the victim of her father's vow to sacrifice a person in return for victory in battle

And then my thoughts moved in a different direction, and I asked what if I addressed more general "women" related topics, like:

- Where are the women in the creation stories, or who did Adam and Eve's boys marry?
- Why in the gospel of Matthew's genealogy are women mentioned? Most biblical genealogies do not include many or any women.

I reached out to my local colleagues and received even more guidance, resources, and ideas, and with that and my own research, my sermon series has evolved into a plan that I could not complete in time for publication in this newsletter. So, I thought I would just offer this comment about the time-consuming nature of this process and where I am at the time of this newsletter's publication. I will probably announce the final draft of the schedule by the middle of June! So, here is what I can offer now:

Chesapeake Housing Mission Ramp Build:
The Ramp Build we had planned for Saturday, June 7
has been postponed until Saturday, October 25.

Until then, we thought it would be nice to let you know a little bit
about the Chesapeake Housing Mission.



We built our first ramp on a warm and sunny Saturday, December 13 in 2017. Since then, we have built five more ramps on June 14, 2019, November 12, 2022, June 10, 2023, November 4, 2023, and May 14, 2024. For this we have our congregation's name printed in CHM's Annual Report as one of 52 volunteer groups, and one of their 32 Compassion Builders (donors who gave more than \$250).

One might assume a ramp only helps with accessibility to one's home and the ability to get the house, but there are greater effects of a ramp as illustrated in this graphic. And if you are good with acronyms, ROI means "Return on Investment." Finally, one more graphic I will share is about CHM's Volunteers.



753% ROI

2023: A YEAR OF TRANSFORMATIVE IMPACT

At CHM, home modifications are not just about accessibility—they are about dignity, independence, and health. In 2023, we reinforced our role as a leader in demonstrating how critical home repairs lead to improved well-being and substantial cost savings in healthcare. By surveying our clients and collaborating with TidalHealth on healthcare utilization data, we measured the real impact of our work. All results compare data from six months before CHM performed work to six months after.



Life-Changing Results

- ◆ Falls reduced by **90.3%** – from 62 falls before to just 6 after, dramatically lowering injury risk.
- ◆ Community connection improved by **78.9%**, helping clients regain independence.
- ◆ Daily outlook improved by **90.2%**, reflecting enhanced quality of life.

Healthcare Cost Reductions

- ◆ Overall healthcare charges dropped by **71.0%** – from \$2,250,461 before to \$652,950 after for 72 clients
- ◆ Hospital admission charges fell by **80.4%** – from \$1,945,189 before to \$381,266 after for 39 clients
- ◆ Total hospital admissions reduced by **72.6%** – from 62 before to 17 after for 39 clients
- ◆ Total healthcare visits decreased by **27.0%** – from 226 visits before to 165 after for 72 clients

The Financial Impact: A 753% Return on Investment

For every \$1,000 invested in CHM's home modifications, approximately \$7,500 was saved in healthcare costs. These results highlight how safe housing prevents costly medical interventions, keeping individuals in their homes and out of institutional care.
