August 3

- Women in the Early Church
 - o Prisca

 - o Priscilla, Chloe, Lydia, Apphia, Nympha, the mother of John Mark, and possibly the "elect lady" of John's second epistle
- Scripture
 - o Romans 16:1-6 Phoebe, Prisca, Mary
 - I Cor 1:11 Chloe
 - o Acts 18:2, 18, 26 Priscilla
 - o Acts 16:14-5 and 40 Lydia

August 10

- On this Sunday, members of the local Masonic Lodge will be worshipping with us, and Pastor Dale will **ATTEMPT** to discuss these challenging verses:
- I Timothy 2:8-12 -- women should dress themselves modestly and decently in suitable clothing, not with their hair braided, or with gold, pearls, or expensive clothes, ¹obut with good works, as is proper for women who profess reverence for God. ¹¹Let a woman* learn in silence with full submission. ¹²I permit no woman* to teach or to have authority over a man;* she is to keep silent.

- I Cor 14:34-35 -- ³⁴women should be silent in the churches. For they are not permitted to speak, but should be subordinate, as the law also says. ³⁵If there is anything they desire to know, let them ask their husbands at home. For it is shameful for a woman to speak in church.
- And possibly a verse or two about equality in Gal 3:28 and Phil 4:3

August 17

- The next difficult topic will be the "not so successful women of the OT" including:
 - o Lot's daughters Gen 19:8
 - o Women of Gibeah Judges 19:24ff
 - o Jephthah's daughter Judges 11
 - o Dinah, sibling of the 12 brothers Genesis 34

August 24

- Marriage and the related topics of levirate marriage and divorce will be the focus of worship this Sunday.
- Scripture:
 - o Genesis 2:18-25
 - o Ephesians 5:21-33
 - o I Corinthians 7:1-11

August 31

- Pastor Dale was tempted to title this sermon "Catfights of the Old Testament" but might better be called, "Hebrew women who did not get along."
- We will discuss
 - o Sarah and Hagar, Genesis 21
 - o Leah and Rachel, Genesis 29


Pastor's Message

First, I would like to begin with a wonderful thank you to everyone who offered my family, and I, cards, kind words, prayers, food, and support of all kinds. Your actions speak loudly, and I thank you for everything you have done for us over the last weeks. I must admit, it was not until after the funeral that I realized how physically and emotionally exhausted I had become.

Today though, I would ask for continued prayers. My stepmother, Gerry, was admitted to the hospital less than twelve hours after the funeral reception and remains there even as I write this note. One can guess that she is not well and may demand even more care than my father demanded. Again, thank you for your continued support.

The heart of my pastoral message is inspired by a conversation in our weekly lectionary group. A couple of weeks ago, someone noted that in the letter to the Colossians, the focus of the epistle lectionary reading in July and August, the theme of reconciliation was lifted up. I thought this theme was relevant and appropriate for our world today and did not want to ignore this message while I was preaching on "Women of the Bible" this summer. (By the way, I appreciate all the positive comments about this sermon series. I have learned a lot and enjoyed preparing these sermons.)

So, I thought I might offer a primer on the Letter to the Colossians in my article this month. Interestingly enough, the theme of reconciliation is not exactly central to the letter, but I will tell you about the letter anyway!



Basics:

- Place in the New Testament: Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, 1 and 2 Thessalonians
- Length: 4 Chapters
- Colossae was located in Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey)
- Meant to be read by Laodicean church as well
- Paul never visited Colossae in person, but was concerned about their questionable religious practices

Authorship (Disputed)

- Some argue it is truly Paul
 - o If yes, it was likely written in Ephesus
 - o Around mid-50's
- Others say it is written in Paul's name (pseudepigraphic writing)
 - o If yes, it is simply a literary device and not an actual letter to a church
 - o The argument for this is an earthquake destroyed Colossae in 60 AD
 - At about the same time as Paul was executed
- It is grouped with Paul's other "prison letters"
 - o Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon

The Problem Paul was addressing:

- Interpreters are mixed on identifying what the "problem" might be. Some believe the problem was acknowledging, if not actually worshipping, heavenly powers associated with the stars, while others think the "problem" may be a more Jewish variation of Christian faith.
- The Star Problem is suggested by:
 - o "thrones, or dominions or rulers or powers" -- 1:16
 - \circ "elemental spirits of the universe" 2:8
 - o "angels" 2:18
 - These may suggest a belief in control over human destiny by the stars and not an actual belief in the divinity of stars
- The "More Jewish variation" of the faith is suggested by:
 - Teachers demanding circumcision 2:!1
 - Observance of festivals, new moons, and sabbaths 2:16
 - Dietary restrictions 2:16 and 2:21
 - Worship of angels 2:18
- In response to the problem the author says Christ:
 - Is the image of God 1:15
 - \circ In whom the wholeness of the deity bodily dwells 2:9
 - Creates 1:16
 - Gives coherence to and has absolute power over all beings 1:17-20
 - And the cosmic "principalities and powers" have no independent authority – 2:15
 - o And more...

- Style and Authorship
 - The style and diction of Colossians is markedly different from the other letters clearly written by Paul
 - o Many sentences are long and involved
 - o Synonyms and parallel expressions abound
 - o There are 34 words found nowhere else in the New Testament
 - o Many of the connective words and particles Paul uses regularly are not found in this letter.
 - Several theological themes in Colossians are not found in other Pauline letters
 - o Those arguing for truly genuine Pauline authorship suggest the differences are due to the fact that this letter would have been written very late in Paul's life.

Again, thank you for your support during the time of my father's hospitalization, hospice time, and death. I also hope you learned a little bit and are inspired to learn more about Paul's letter to the Colossians.

Chesapeake Association News:

Pastor Dale received the following letter from his colleague Rev. Kelly Sission at First and St. Stephen's UCC in the Stoneleigh area of Towson.

It has been a long and arduous process, but **First and St. Stephen's** has made the difficult decision to sell its properties. Like many churches, we can no longer sustain the aging building, and it has become more of a burden than a ministry. Also, with the need to cut finances — all paid staff have been given 'end of service' notices. They vary in end dates based on the tasks at hand. **My last Sunday will be Sept. 21**, though I remain the pastor of the church through December 21st with accrued sabbatical and vacation. The projected last service in the building is **November 23rd**.

Let me be clear — at this point **the church is NOT closing.** Those are decisions that will be made in the months ahead. For now, the church properties and staff are the only decisions finalized.

First and Stephen's has a long history. As its name suggests, dating back to 1750, First German Reformed Church was the first German Reformed and second Protestant Church in Baltimore. It started six other congregations including St. Stephen's, which later re-merged and in 1928 moved to the Rodgers Forge/Stoneleigh area as First and Stephen's Reformed Church. Similar to Immanuel's history, in the 1930s, they became First and St. Stephen's Evangelical and Reformed Church. In 1957 with the merger of the Congregational Christian Churches and the Evangelical and Reformed Church, they became First and St. Stephen's United Church of Christ.

Our friend, Rev. Selena Blackwell's church, St. John's UCC in Waukegan, Illinois has gone through a very similar experience.

Christmas in September


