Scripture: Habakkuk 1:1-4 and 2:1-4, Psalm 37:1-9, 2 Timothy 1:1-14, Luke 17:5-10

The first Sunday in October will bring us World Communion Sunday and lessons about patience, trust, and humility. The prophet Habakkuk complains to God, and after waiting awhile, God offers him, and us, a word of comfort. The psalm is an exhortation to patience and trust and Paul, in his second letter to Timothy, offers words of thanksgiving and encouragement to his young companion. In the gospel of Luke, we find two sayings of Jesus. The first of the two is his response to the disciple's request for greater faith, and the second is Jesus' comparison of the role of the disciples to the work and position of a slave or servant.

Dr. Steven Kraftchick will be the Supply Preacher

Dr. Steven J. Kraftchick, a friend of Rev. Dr. Tom Long and resident of Town Point, taught courses in New Testament interpretation, directed the Advanced and General Studies programs, and was involved with Candler's digital learning initiative until his retirement in 2020. He was also a faculty member in the New Testament Course of Study in Emory's Graduate Division of Religion. Kraftchick came to Candler in 1983, and previously taught at Princeton Theological Seminary, Oberlin College, and The School of Theology at Sewanee: The University of the South.

Scripture:

1 Thessalonians 4:9-12

9 Now concerning love of the brothers and sisters,* you do not need to have anyone write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another; 10 and indeed you do love all the brothers and sisters* throughout Macedonia. But we urge you, beloved,* to do so more and more, 11 to aspire to live quietly, to mind your own affairs, and to work with your hands, as we directed you, 12 so that you may behave properly towards outsiders and be dependent on no one.

I Thessalonians 5:12-24

12 But we appeal to you, brothers and sisters,* to respect those who labor among you and have charge of you in the Lord and admonish you; ¹³esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves. ¹⁴And we urge you, beloved,* to admonish the idlers, encourage the faint-hearted, help the weak, be patient with all of them. ¹⁵See that none of you repays evil for evil but always seek to do good to one another and to all. ¹⁶Rejoice always, ¹⁷pray without ceasing, ¹⁸give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. ¹⁹Do not quench the Spirit. ²⁰Do not despise the words of prophets,* ²¹but test everything; hold fast to what is good; ²²abstain from every form of evil. ²³ May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound* and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. ²⁴The one who calls you is faithful, and he will do this.

Sunday, October 26: 20th Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 25

Scripture: Sirach 35:12-17 or Jeremiah 14:7-10, Psalm 84:1-7, 2 Timothy 4:6-8 and 16-18, Luke 18:9-14

This week, the thematic scriptural choices offered by the Revised Common Lectionary include a choice between a lesson from Sirach (a book found in the Apocrypha) and the prophet Jeremiah. In Sirach, the book written in the time between the Old and New Testaments, we have a lesson that talks about divine justice that builds on the ethic of helping the poor and the prophet Jeremiah writes about the people of Israel who humbly confess their iniquities to God, during a life-threatening drought. Humility continues as a theme in Luke as we read the Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector where one prays very loudly, publicly, and insincerely while the other prays humbly, sincerely, and privately. The Psalm is about the joy of worship in the Temple and in 2 Timothy Paul looks toward his death and a heavenly reward.

Pastor's Message

From 1996 to 2008, I served St. Vincent United Church of Christ in East Vincent Township, near Spring City and Pottstown, Pennsylvania. About twelve miles to the north was Faulkner Swamp United Church of Christ. I share this because on October 15 of this year the United Church of Christ will celebrate the 300th anniversary of the first celebration of Communion by a German Reformed Congregation in North America. That congregation was the Faulkner Swamp Reformed Church.

The United Church of Christ, the denomination to which we belong, has primarily four major roots. They are:

- The first Congregational church in America was established by the Pilgrims in 1620 at Plymouth, Massachusetts, with the First Parish Church. These were Separatist Puritans who had fled religious persecution in England. The broader Congregational tradition was also rooted in the Massachusetts Bay Colony, where numerous Puritan churches were founded starting in the 1630s.
- Members of the German Reformed church members began immigrating to America in the late 17th and early 18th centuries, with large numbers of German settlers, including many Reformed individuals, arriving in Pennsylvania starting in the 1680s and 1700s. Organized congregations began forming in the early 18th century, with <u>John Philip Boehm</u>, an immigrant, organizing the first German Reformed congregations in Pennsylvania around 1720 and ordaining the first pastor in 1729.
- The German Evangelical church came to the United States various waves. The mid-19th century saw a surge of German immigration, with many settlers moving west to states like Missouri and Illinois, where they formed the basis of the new German denomination in the U.S., The German Evangelical Synod of North America. There was also a group of German immigrants who entered the U.S. through Baltimore too. These Midwest and East Coast Germans are the ancestors of the people who founded our congregation.
- The Christian Church, a branch of the United Church of Christ arose in the 19th century, drawing from Methodist, Baptist, and Presbyterian influences on the American frontier and emphasizing the simplicity of first-century Christianity.

In addition to these four roots which are traditionally recognized as the "four major ancestors of the denomination, more recently the contributions and participation of the Afro-Christian Convention has been acknowledged. The Afro-Christian Convention was a historical religious convention of African American churches which also participated in the formation of the United Church of Christ (UCC) in 1957, bringing its unique spirit of Afro-Christian spirituality and advocacy for liberation. Today, it is recognized as the UCC's "fifth stream" and continues to influence the denomination through groups like United Black Christians (UBC), preserving Black church history and promoting racial justice.

One can see, while not the oldest roots or foundations of our denomination, the German heritage of the United Church of Christ is strong. The Evangelical and Reformed (E & R) Church was created in 1934 by the merger of the two German-American Protestant churches: the Reformed Church in the United States and the Evangelical Synod of North America. This denomination was short-lived, existing for only 23 years before it merged with the Congregational Christian Churches in 1957 to form the United Churches of Christ (UCC). It is this heritage we remember and celebrate this year.

The 300th anniversary of the first communion of the German Reformed Church at Falkner Swamp (or Falkner Swamp) has been celebrated throughout 2025. The initial communion service took place on October 15, 1725, and the anniversary commemorations include special services, reflections on heritage, and community events organized by the Pennsylvania Conferences of the United Church of Christ (UCC).

It is my understanding that Rev. Stephen Fair, our Supply Preacher from September, is using a slightly edited (and translated) version of the original 1725 communion liturgy at the worship service at United Evangelical United Church of Church in Baltimore on Sunday, October 12. Furthermore, one of his, and our friends, Rev. Selena Blackwell, will be preaching on that special Sunday as well.


PRE-PAID FUEL 2025-2026

\$10,000 Heating Oil

This year, there was also about \$1000 used to upgrade our WiFi and repair the electronic sign.
