All Saints Sunday

Sunday, November 2: 21st Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 26 **Scripture:** Daniel 7:1-3 and 15-18, Psalm 149, Ephesians 1:11-23, Luke 6:20-31

On Sunday, November 2, in order to celebrate the lives of our members and friends who have died in the past year, we will use the lectionary readings for All Saint's Day which is November 1, the day after All Hallows Eve. Our lessons this Sunday begin with an apocalyptic reading from the prophet Daniel. In this lesson, Daniel sees a vision where, not the kings of the earth, but the saints of the Most High (God) shall receive and possess the kingdom forever. In the Psalm, saying, "Praise the Lord!" and "Sing to the Lord a new song," the psalmist offers a song about the Lord's love of Israel. The theme of praise and hope continues in Ephesians where we have a prayer of hope. It tells the church in Ephesus, and us, "I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe. In the gospel of Luke's parallel to Matthew's Sermon on the Mount, Luke offers another version of the Beatitudes in the Sermon on the Plain.

Veteran's Sunday and Congregational Meeting

As we did last year, we will honor the Veterans of our church family by offering special prayers during worship and sharing a PowerPoint with their photos in the narthex before and after the worship. We will include all the photos which were shared last year and invite others who might like to add their relatives and loved ones to the presentation. Please speak with Pastor Dale about adding them to the presentation.

Sunday, November 9: 22nd Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 27, Veteran's Sunday **Scripture:** Job 19:23-27a, Psalm 17:1-9, 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5 and 13-17, Luke 20:27-38

As we return to the regular schedule of Sundays after Pentecost, and approach the end of the church liturgical year, the themes of resurrection, judgement, end times, and the last days of Christ appear. This is evident this week in the gospel lesson where in response to the Sadducee's question about childlessness and levirate marriage,

Jesus answers questions about resurrection and in Second Thessalonians we have a word of patience and caution regarding the coming of the Day of the Lord. The passage from Job is a portion of Job's response to his friend's advice, where Job says, I know that my Redeemer lives. In the Psalm, David pleads his integrity and prays to be preserved.

Stewardship Sunday

On this Sunday we will discuss financial matters of the congregation, discuss faithful approaches to stewardship, and offer an opportunity for our church members and friends to make a pledge, or faith promise to financially support Immanuel Church.

Sunday, November 16: 23rd Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 28

Scripture: Malachi 4:1-2a, Psalm 98, 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13, Luke 21:5-19 In the very last chapter of the Old Testament, the prophet Malachi, speaking for God, promises that all the evildoers will be burned up like stubble and the sun of righteousness will rise with healing in its wings. A call to praise the righteous Lord is offered in the psalm, saying, "Make a joyful noise all the earth," and "O sing to the Lord a new song, for he has done marvelous things!" Paul offers the Thessalonians a blunt warning against idleness and urges them to work hard. And finally, in the gospel of Luke, between Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the events of Maundy Thursday, the destruction of the Temple is foretold.

Thanksgiving Sunday

Sunday, November 23: Last Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 29, Reign of Christ. Scripture: Deuteronomy 26:1-11, Psalm 100, Philippians 4:4-9, John 6:25-35 In The passage from Deuteronomy, God gives, as an inheritance, to the Jewish people a land to possess and in which to settle. It also includes instructions to give thanks with the first fruits of the land and their tithes. Psalm 100, a psalm of thanksgiving, begins with the familiar words, "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come into his presence with singing." In Paul's letter to the church in Philippi, Paul encourages their members to rejoice in the Lord always, not to worry about anything, and give thanks to God in everything through prayer and supplication. And finally in the gospel of John, following the feeding of the 5000, and Jesus' walking on water, his disciples search for him. When they find him, he challenges them, reminds them of their ancestors who ate manna in the desert, and then proclaims, "I am the bread of life."

First Sunday of Advent


On this Sunday, the plans include a coffee hour after worship and the "Hanging of the Greens" or the completion of the decorating of the sanctuary for Christmas.

Sunday, November 30: First Sunday of Advent

Scripture: Isaiah 2:1-5, Psalm 122, Romans 13:11-14, Matthew 24:36-44 As the season of Advent begins, our first reading comes from the prophet Isaiah. In the second superscription or introduction of Isaiah, which includes the familiar words, "they shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks," the

prophet describes the glorified or new Jerusalem. The psalm is a song of praise and prayer for Jerusalem. In Paul's letter to the Romans, the apostle offers an urgent appeal to put away works of darkness and put on the armor of light. In the gospel lesson from Matthew, mentioning Noah, Jesus encourages us to stay awake and be watchful because the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.

Pastor's Message



For those unaware, or perhaps not appreciating the historical context of the meme to the left, October 31, in addition to being Halloween, is Reformation Day.

According to Philip Melanchthon, 31 October 1517 was the day Martin Luther nailed his Ninety-five Theses on the door of the All Saints'
Church in Wittenberg. The Theses were a list of theological and practical concerns within the Roman Catholic church Martin Luther, and likely others, felt needed to be "discussed" publicly.

The holiday is significant for the <u>Lutheran</u> and <u>Reformed</u> (like us at Immanuel) Churches, although other <u>Protestant</u> communities also tend to commemorate the day. The <u>Roman</u>

<u>Catholic Church</u> recognized it only recently, and often sends its official representatives in <u>ecumenical spirit</u> to various commemoration events held by Protestants.

The Reformation, also known as the Protestant Reformation or the European Reformation, was a time of major <u>theological</u> movement in <u>Western Christianity</u> in 16th-century <u>Europe</u> that posed a religious and political challenge to the <u>papacy</u> and the authority of the <u>Catholic Church</u> hierarchy. Towards the end of the <u>Renaissance</u>, the Reformation marked the beginning of <u>Protestantism</u>. It is considered one of the events that signified the end of the <u>Middle Ages</u> and the beginning of the <u>early modern</u> <u>period</u> in Europe.

Core tenets of the Reformation (The five solas)

• Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone):

The Bible is the highest and final authority for faith and life, not church tradition, or the Pope.

Sola Gratia (Grace Alone):

Salvation is a gift from God's unmerited favor, not something earned by human effort.

Sola Fide (Faith Alone):

People are declared righteous (justified) through faith in Jesus Christ alone, not by good works

Solus Christus (Christ Alone):

Jesus Christ is the only mediator between God and humanity, and salvation is only possible through him.

• Soli Deo Gloria (For the Glory of God Alone):

The ultimate purpose of life is to glorify God in all things.

Other Key Points

Authority:

The Reformation challenged the authority of the Pope and the Catholic Church hierarchy, shifting spiritual authority to the Bible.

• Corruption:

It was sparked by, and reacted against, perceived corruption within the Catholic Church, such as the sale of <u>indulgences</u>. Indulgences, in the Catholic Church, are the remission of the temporal punishment for sins whose guilt has already been forgiven. They are gained through specific actions and conditions and are either **partial** or **plenary** (total). Historically, the practice became controversial, particularly due to abuses like the selling of indulgences for money, which was a key point of contention for <u>Martin Luther</u> and a catalyst for the Protestant Reformation.

Personal Relationship:

Reformers promoted the idea that individuals should have a direct, personal relationship with God, taking personal responsibility for their faith. This is most easily seen in our Time of Confession. Protestants, like us, are not required to confess our sinful behaviors to a priest but confess directly to God.

· Accessibility:

The Reformation led to the Bible being translated into vernacular languages (the language we use and understand every day), making it accessible to the common people and helping to spread literacy. This is why I often prefer not to use the Thee's and Thou's and similar language.

Those are the main points of the Reformation, known as the "five solas." As a quick review, they center on the belief that salvation comes from grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone, as revealed in Scripture alone, all for the glory of God alone. The movement rejected the authority of the Pope and many Catholic practices, asserting the Bible as the sole authority for faith and conduct. It was also a response to perceived corruption within the Catholic Church and advocated for a more direct, personal relationship with God.


However:

We, and The Church of Jesus Christ, are who we are because of the actions of Martin Luther and many others who came before and after him. Some church traditions changed quickly, some radically, some more slowly, and without straying very far from the Roman Catholic church. However, it can be argued, and we seldom highlight these consequences, that obscure theological debates, patriarchal culture, catechetical indoctrination, social injustice, anti-Semitism, and state-run churches were a prominent side of the Reformation.

Furthermore, It is uncertain if Martin Luther personally nailed the 95 Theses to the church door, and many historians consider the famous image of him nailing them to be a myth or an embellishment. What is certain is that he posted them, likely on October 31, 1517, but this was more likely through an act of posting them to be publicly debated as was the academic custom at the time, which often happened by simply affixing them to the door with glue or tacks, not necessarily with a hammer and nails.

That's Enough for Now:

That was a primer, a Reader's Digest or Cliff Notes rendering, of the important parts of the Reformation. Hope I --

Faith Promise Sunday Sunday, November 16, 2025

As noted in the Worship Schedule earlier in the Newsletter, Sunday, November 16 will be our Faith Promise Sunday. Some churches call this Pledge Sunday, but whatever we call it, it is a time when we are called to consider how we will support our congregation with our gifts of time, talents, and particularly financial resources in the coming year.

Stewardship is the job of <u>supervising</u> or taking care of something, such as an organization or property. Biblical stewardship is the belief that God is the ultimate owner of everything, and humans are God's managers, responsible for wisely using the resources He has entrusted to them. This includes not just money, but also one's time, talents, and spiritual gifts, which are to be used for His purposes and to serve others. It is a whole-life responsibility that is an act of worship, service, and giving.

The Deacons of our congregation, who were charged with nurturing our faithful stewardship, many years ago created this **Faith Promise Sunday**. As it has said in previous announcements of this Sunday:

The process would provide an opportunity for members and friends to consider what percentage of their income they feel God is calling them to give next year. Each household would be invited make a "faith promise" between them and God, concerning the estimated amount. Whether large or small, this offering reflects our response to God's love and blessing in our lives.

The "faith promise" you make is not "in addition" to what you already give to the church. The process is intended for us to seriously and faithfully consider how we will support Immanuel United Church of Christ and the gospel we proclaim. The "promise" is not a legal and unchangeable document. Our church leaders will not connect your pledge with your name. Neither is it "binding." If you lose your income, or have serious financial challenges, please feel free to make adjustments in your church giving. On the other side, if you win the lottery or something similar, again, please feel free to "make adjustments" in your church giving!

And so, once again, on Faith Promise Sunday there will be an opportunity for members and friends of the congregation to dedicate their private "faith promise" pledges during our worship time. The Faith Promise Cards can be seen below and will be available on Sunday, November 16.

You will be invited to complete the sections on each card, separate them, and deposit the first two in separate containers. The third card will be for your records. Thank you for your faithful support.

We will need to have volunteers to help with set-up, day-of for registration (early morning), kitchen help for breakfast, then for lunch, and for clean-up.



NUT AND GOODIE SALE


